She now serves as executive trustee of the Kaisa Heritage Center (華裔文化傳統中心), a repository of the historical and cultural legacy of the Tsinoys that houses Bahay Tsinoy, a museum of the Chinese in Philippine life (菲華歷史博物館) and the Chinben See Memorial Library. She is past president of the prestigious International Society for the Study of Chinese Overseas (ISSCO 世界海外華人研究會) and past president of the PACS. She gives lectures in conferences in the Philippines and abroad. She has authored, co-authored, edited, and co-edited 21 books, among them the five-volume *The Chinese in the Philippines: Problems and Perspectives*; *Tsinoy* – *the Story of the Chinese in Philippine Life*, and Philippines-China Relations - Beyond Disputed Waters, co-edited with Chito Sta. Romana.

JOSE SANTIAGO L. STA. ROMANA is currently the Philippine ambassador to the Peoples Republic of China. He was a former president and currently a member of the advisory board of PACS. He is an award-winning journalist. He served as the Beijing bureau chief of ABC News. He won an Emmy award in the news and documentary category in 2000. In 2008, he was

awarded by the Overseas Press Club of America for covering the massive China earthquake. He lived and worked in China until his retirement in 2010.

WILFRIDO VILLACORTA is an honorary fellow of PACS. He finished his bachelor's degree in Political Science at the University of the Philippines and earned his MA and PhD in Politics (major in International Law and Relations) at the Catholic University of America in Washington, DC. He conducted his doctoral research at the United Nations and in Southeast Asia as a Woodrow Wilson Dissertation Fellow. He is professor emeritus at De La Salle University, where he served as dean and senior vice president. He was a delegate to the 1986 Constitutional Commission, which framed the present 1987 Constitution. He sponsored the article on education, national language, arts and culture, and co-sponsored the provisions on social justice and human rights, as well as the sections mandating an independent foreign policy, renunciation of war as an instrument of national policy, and freedom from nuclear weapons in our territory. In 2003, Villacorta was appointed by former President Gloria Arroyo as the first Filipino deputy secretary-general of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN). In 2010, former President Benigno Aquino III swore him in as Philippine ambassador and permanent representative to ASEAN. In 2016, he was named by President Aquino as one of the convenors of the Citizens' Peace Council, to forge a consensus on the Bangsamoro Basic Law.

PAULO BENEDICTO C. VILLAR is assistant professor in the College of Social Sciences and Development at the Polytechnic University of the Philippines (PUP) and a member of the board of directors of PACS. He completed his master's degree in Asian Studies specializing on China Studies and bachelor's degree in Social Sciences major in Area Studies both from the University of the Philippines. In 2017, he completed a research fellowship

in Zhengzhou and Beijing, People's Republic of China. He was research assistant at the University of the Philippines (Manila) and contracted researcher for a non-government organization. He is currently the chief of the Center for Human Rights Studies at PUP. PREFACE

Since 1975, the Philippines has been observing a one-China policy.
